

Prison Book Program exists for one purpose → to send free reading material to prisoners throughout the United States. We have been doing it since 1972. We are not a library and we have no books for you to purchase. All books, magazines, and other reading materials are donated to prisoners free of charge. They are yours to keep. Please feel free to share these books and the ideas in them.

We work to fill your book requests as quickly as possible, but we sometimes receive such a large quantity of letters that orders can be delayed anywhere from 3 to 6 months.

Prison Book Program can rarely match specific requests for titles or authors, but we try to make the following book categories available. Please tell us which subjects you enjoy reading. It always helps us if you can give us a few different options.

MOST AVAILABLE BOOK CATEGORIES:

- Dictionaries, Thesauruses, or general reference
- GED and Education (Math, Science, Reading or Writing)
- General Legal Self Help
- Health, Psychology, or Self-Improvement

- Gay, Lesbian, Bisexual, or Transsexual Literature

- Sports or Hobbies
- Fiction: classic, contemporary, fantasy, thriller, westerns, short stories, drama, poetry or plays.

Please note that we rarely have Bibles or books on: real estate, investments, business, specific laws, almanacs, Spanish/English dictionaries, Wiccan spirituality, or trade skills. If you request any of these topics, please provide us some other options too. If your first choice is not in stock, we will send you a substitution.

PLEASE HELP US:

- Clearly print your NAME, ID NUMBER, and ADDRESS on both the outside and inside of your request letters.
- Tell us exactly what restrictions your prison places on incoming book packages (for example: paperback only, hardcover okay, maximum number, new or newish books only, invoice required, prior approval required, etc.).
- Let us know if you are in the process of being transferred from one location to another location. We'll do our best to keep track of your exact location and get your books to you.
- Stamps, pre-stamped envelopes and self-addressed stamped envelopes (SASE) are welcomed, but are not required.
- Our packages are shipped via United States Postal Services, using media mail rate.
- We do not offer any pen-pal services.

- Send no more than two book requests per person per year, because we have a limited budget.
- Only one dictionary per person will be honored.

Unfortunately, we do not send books to California, Maryland (except Jessup, Cumberland, and Hagerstown), Massachusetts, Michigan, Nevada, Texas, and certain individual prisons. If we receive a request from one of these locations, we will reply to you with a copy of our resource list.

WHO WAS LUCY PARSONS?

Lucy Parsons (1853-1942) was a radical American labor organizer, anarchist, and remembered as a powerful public speaker. She was born in Texas (likely as a slave) to the parents of Native American, African American, and Mexican ancestry. Because of her singular fight against social and economic oppression, Lucy led a controversial life. Lucy Parsons always kept a sharp eye on the social revolution that she was convinced was necessary to change the glaring excesses of the oppressive capitalist system.

Lucy Parsons was a fearless revolutionary.

The legacy of late Lucy is alive in the Boston area where, one can find the Lucy Parsons Center, a bookstore and gathering place for a wide range of anarchists, political radicals, activists, and generally concerned citizens.

HIV/AIDS & HEPATITIS C: STRAIGHT-UP FACTS

HIV/AIDS is a serious health threat for prison populations. Prisoners are at exceptional risk for infection with HIV because of the association of injection drug use with incarceration.

HIV stands for human immunodeficiency virus. It is the virus that causes AIDS. HIV is different from most other viruses because it attacks the immune system. The immune system gives our bodies the ability to fight infections. HIV finds & destroys a type of white blood cell (T or CD4 cells) the immune system must have to fight disease.

AIDS stands for acquired immunodeficiency syndrome. AIDS is the final stage of HIV infection. It can take years for a person infected with HIV, even without treatment, to reach this stage. Having AIDS means that the virus has weakened the immune system to the point at which the body has a difficult time fighting infections. When someone has one or more of these infections and a low number of T cells, he or she has AIDS.

HIV cannot live for very long outside the body. As a result, the virus is not transmitted through day-to-day activities such as shaking hands, hugging, or a casual kiss. You cannot become infected from a toilet seat, drinking fountain, doorknob, dishes, drinking glasses, food, or pets. You also cannot get HIV from mosquitoes.

HIV is primarily found in the blood, semen, or vaginal fluid of an infected person. HIV is transmitted in three main ways:

- Having sex (anal, vaginal, or oral) w/ someone infected with HIV.
- Sharing needles and syringes with someone infected with HIV.
- Being exposed (fetus or infant) to HIV before or during birth or through breast feeding.

Inside prisons, the primary risk behaviors for the transmission of HIV are the sharing of injecting equipment and unprotected sex (primarily men having sex with men). Within prisons, additional risk factors include: sharing or reuse of tattooing and body piercing equipment, and sharing of razors for shaving.

Hepatitis C does not get talked about as much as HIV/AIDS, but it is another potentially deadly disease that is transmitted the same way as HIV, ultimately causing severe liver damage. Hepatitis C is highly contagious. It is estimated that hepatitis C infection among U.S. prisoners is 9-10 times more prevalent than among non-prisoners. Coinfection with the 2 viruses is extremely common in prisons, and is associated with rapid progression of hepatitis C disease, making treatment of both diseases particularly urgent.

Sharing works (needles, syringes, droppers, spoons, cottons or cookers) is sharing the risk. Many, many people in prison who get HIV/AIDS or hepatitis C have gotten it from using drugs and sharing their works. The older belief that you could share works after cleaning them out with bleach or vinegar for 30 seconds has been discredited. It will not keep you safe. If you shoot, you must find your own personal set of works -- hard to do, but worth the same amount of effort you put into obtaining the drugs.

Having any type of sex without a condom is an easy way to get HIV or hepatitis C. You are always at risk unless you have safe sex with all your partners.

You can also do the following:

- Abstain from sex (do not have oral, anal, or vaginal sex) until you are in a relationship with only one person, are having sex with only each other, and each of you know the other's HIV status.

- If only one of you has HIV, use a latex condom and lubricant every time you have sex.
- If both you and your partner have HIV/AIDS, use condoms to prevent other sexually transmitted diseases (STDs) and possible infection with a different strain of HIV.
- Do not inject illicit drugs (drugs not prescribed by your doctor). If you do inject drugs, do the following:
- Use only clean needles, syringes, and other works.
- Never share needles, syringes, or other works.
- Be careful not to expose yourself to another person's blood.
- Get tested for HIV at least once a year.
- Consider getting counseling and treatment for your drug use.
- Get vaccinated against Hepatitis A and B viruses. No vaccine against hepatitis C is available.
- Do not have sex when you are taking drugs or drinking alcohol because being high can make you more likely to take risks.

Anyone can spread these diseases, and anyone can get them. It does not matter if you are a man or a woman, gay or straight. Even healthylooking people can be infected so having sex or sharing needles with that person can give you these horrible diseases.

Men who force other men to have any kind of sex (even with a condom) are rapists. If you have sex against your will, it is rape, every time. Every man who rapes or is being raped faces the deadly dangers of HIV/AIDS and hepatitis C, unless he uses a condom.

Only you can decide the risk you are willing to take with your health.

Please take the time to educate yourself.
